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COMPLETING P600 MILLION WORTH OF PROJECTS IN AUGUST AFPPS reports more than P49 million residuals for gov't

The AFP Procurement Service (AFPPS) completed P630 million worth of projects for the month of August alone and reported more than P49 million in residuals in favor of the government.

In his report to AFP Chief of Staff Gen. Gregorio Pio Catapang Jr. through the Office of the AFP Deputy Chief of Staff for Logistics (J4), AFPPS Commander Col Alvin Francis A Javier PA (GSC) said that the Service processed a total of 2,873 purchase orders, work orders and contracts from various catered units in August.

The AFPPS completed a total of P635,367,501.28 worth of projects through various modes of procurement from August 1 to 31.

Col Javier said that the Service managed to achieve a total of P49,700,995.01 in residuals as the

AFPPS expects more residuals from ongoing projects with approved budget of P6 billion

Currently, the AFPPS has ongoing projects with approved budget for the contracts (ABCs) of P6,148,192,280.02 for various units of the AFP. With the bid price only totaling to P3,707,240,872.38, the Service is projected to register significant savings in favor of the government.

The projects are covered by 5,168 purchase orders.

Bulk of the acquisition is processed through public bidding with ABC worth P4,293,519,691.04 but with only P2,960,778,853.58 bid price.

approved budget for the contracts (ABCs) was P685,068,496.29.

Bulk of the residuals or savings – P42,981,209.36, was achieved from public bidding. The AFP allotted P384,075,919.87 for 31 purchase orders and the bid price

only totaled P341,094,710.51.

“Through competitive public bidding, we registered huge amount of residuals, thus, maximizing the resources of the AFP for the benefit of the government,” says Col Javier.

In his corner, the Commander cites the concerted efforts of various AFPPS units in achieving residuals in favor of the government -- mostly through competitive and open public bidding as stipulated in Republic Act 9184 or the Government Procurement Reform Act.

The Commander calls for sustained action to further enhance the Service's responsiveness in delivering much-needed requirements of catered units.

Out of the P685,068,496.29 approved budget for the contracts, the total bid price was only P635,367,501.28.

From August 1 to 31, the Service managed to process a total of 2,873 purchase orders, work orders and contracts from various catered units.

We have projections, based on the ongoing projects with approved budget of more than P6 billion, that we will achieve huge residuals for this year.

We attained this by religiously following provisions of the Government Procurement Reform Act or Republic Act 9184, without compromising transparency and accountability during the bidding and canvassing and efficiency in delivering the requirements of our catered units.

This achievement is not possible without the dedication and hard work of our officers, enlisted personnel and civilian employees.

Through your untiring efforts, we are slowly reaping the fruits of a more responsive and efficient Procurement Service, not only in furtherance of the “daang matuwid” policy of our Commander in Chief, President Benigno Simeon Aquino III but also in compliance to the AFP Transformation Roadmap.

103rd CO accepts procured hospital equipment

Acting as secretary of the Technical Inspection and Acceptance Committee (TIAC) of the Philippine Army's 3rd Infantry Division (3ID), 103rd CO chief Lt Col Dean N Cordero (CE) PA, joined the final acceptance of more than P1 million worth of acquisition for Camp Peralta Station Hospital.

Lt Col Cordero, along with other officers of the TIAC-3ID, meticulously inspected the various medical equipment delivered last July 31.

The delivery amounted to P1,202,800.00, covered by five purchase orders (POs). Three proponents were awarded with the projects.

The delivered items were one unit ECG machine, 12 hospital beds, a set of emergency cart, one wheel stretcher, a



set of laryngoscope, two pieces drop lights, one side lamp, two mayo stands, two units dressing cart and treatment cart, a set of pulse oximeter, three sets of aneroid sphygmomanometer and a set of suction pump.

The TIAC, after inspection and verification, found the items compliant to the specifications and have passed the acceptance parameters.

104th CO conducts CMO benefitting civilians

As part of its Civil Military Operation (CMO), the 104th Contracting Office (CO), under Lt Col Atanacio F Sarzadilla PA (GSC), conducted outreach program benefitting civilians.

The 202nd CO, under Lt Col Philip P Pajela PAF, processed a total of 42 purchase orders (POs) from July 1 to August 31, with the projects amounting to more than P6 million.

The 202nd CO reported residuals amounting to P48,700 from the processed POs.

The approved budget for the contract (ABC) covering the 42 POs was P6,905,012. The bid price was P6,857,906.50.

The 202nd CO also received 24 unit procurement requests (UPRs), with ABC of P3,966,004.72, with valid supporting documents.

Lt Col Pajela said that the UPRs are now posted on PhilGEPS as a mandatory requirement in RA 9184 prior to the conduct of canvassing by the 202nd CO's Canvass/Contracting Committee.

The 202nd CO is catering units under the Air Education and Training Command (AETC) and Air Power Institute (API) based at Fernando Air Base in Lipa City.

303rd CO welcomes AFPPS Commander

PABAC Secretariat facilitates bidding for P300 millio

The Philippine Army Bids and Awards Committee (PABAC) Secretariat is facilitating acquisition of battle dress attire (BDA) uniforms and various ammunition with approved budget for the contracts (ABCs) of more than P300 million.

Last August 5, the PABAC opened the bid envelopes submitted by two proponents for the acquisition of 29,144 pairs of BDA for Philippine Army personnel.

The ABC for the BDA procurement was P39,402,688.00

while the lowest bid price was P33,399,024.00, thus a projected residual of P6,003,664.00 in favor of the government.

The PABAC Secretariat also facilitated last August 14 the opening of bid offers for the acquisition of 123,630 rounds of .40mm high explosive ammunition.

Five foreign proponents participated in the public bidding.

The ammunition project has ABC of P268,277,100.00 with a bid price offered at P196,942,590.00. Thus, the government is

Total cost of the two PA projects is P307,679,788.00

The PABAC Secretariat attributed the laudable bidding process to the judicious compliance to the Government Procurement Reform Act or Republic Act 9184 and its implementing rules and regulations which promotes transparency, accountability and fair competition during the conduct of bidding process.

AFPPS holds gender development seminar

As part of the efforts to promote gender sensitivity within the AFP Procurement Service, a one-day seminar on Gender and Development (GAD) Awareness was held last July 18 at the AFPPS Multipurpose Hall.

The seminar was opened by Maj Donald C Hugo (CE) PA, with Ms Veronidia F Murillo, Training Officer of the Office of the Adjutant General (OTAG) as guest lecturer.

The seminar was attended by AFPPS uniformed personnel and civilian employees.

During her lecture, Ms Murillo gave a brief history of GAD which dated back to pre-World War II.

Ms Murillo went on to discuss the differences between GAD and Women in Development (WID) and Women and Development (WAD).

According to her, although the



WID advocated for greater gender equality, it does not tackle the unequal gender relations and roles.

On the other hand, Ms Murillo explained that WAD is a theoretical and practical approach to development. It was introduced into gender studies scholarship in the second half of the 1970s. It arose out of a shift in thinking about women's role in development and concerns.

Ms Murillo said that GAD approach focuses on the socially constructed basis of differences between men and women and the need to challenge existing gender roles

and relations.

She said that GAD marked a shift in thinking about the need to understand how women and men are socially constructed and how those constructions are powerfully reinforced by the social activities. It focuses primarily on gender division of labor and gender as a relation of power embedded in the institutions.

Ms Murillo expounded on two major frameworks: "gender roles" and "social relations analysis."

She explained that "gender roles" is focused on social construction of identities and reveals the expectations from 'maleness and femaleness' in their relative access to resources.

"Social relations analysis", on the other hand, exposes the social dimensions of hierarchical power relations embedded in social institutions and determines influence on the relative position of men and women in society.

Col Javier stressed that the AFPPS is strictly following the provisions of the Government Procurement Reform Act or Republic Act (RA) 9184 in all its procurement.

"Without compromising transparency and following the provisions of RA 9184, we managed to achieve savings in favor of the government," says Col Javier.

Aside from public bidding, the AFPPS completed other projects through shopping with 520 POs amounting to P56,244,143.20; negotiated acquisition with 542 POs worth P60,175,594,000; direct contracting with 1,605 POs costing P171,172,528.72.

The AFPPS also transacted 106 POs with the Procurement Service of the Department of Budget and Management (PSDBM) worth P2,789,328.51, and with the AFP Commissary and Exchange Service (AFPCES) for 69 POs amounting to P3,891,196.34.

Col Javier cited the much-improved internal processes of AFPPS that contributed to the efficient and timely completion of the projects.

In line with President Benigno Simeon Aquino III's "daang matuwid" policy of governance and the AFP Transformation Roadmap, the AFPPS, under the leadership of Col Javier, has implemented innovations and enhanced the existing guidelines on procurement process.

In fact, the AFPPS has applied for an ISO 9001:2008 Certification and is now awaiting approval.

The Service has also started investing time and efforts in equipping its officers and personnel, including civilian employees, with proper training, particularly concerning RA 9184.

"We have taken the initial steps toward a more responsive Procurement Service, we need to pursue more of these efforts and work harder to improve them to sustain our momentum," concludes Col Javier.

AFPPS sends 34 personnel to procurement, contract management seminars

Thirty-four newly-assigned officers, enlisted personnel and even civilian employees of the AFP Procurement Service were sent to undergo a four-day procurement orientation and contract management seminars at the AFPPS Multipurpose Hall in Camp General Emilio Aguinaldo.

In his report to AFP Chief of Staff Gen. Gregorio Pio Catapang Jr., AFPPS Commander Col Alvin Francis A Javier PA (GSC) said that the four-day seminar-orientation was in line with the efforts of the Service to keep its personnel well-informed of the procurement process.

Col Javier explained that the seminar-orientation was conducted to enable the participants to know and understand the basic and commonly used provisions of Republic Act 9184 or the Government Procurement

and guidelines on the fiscal control of AFP procurement transactions,” he adds.

More importantly, Col Javier said that the activity was meant to instill “procurement ethics” to the participants who are newly-assigned to the AFPPS.

A total of seven topics were tackled during the four-day lecture.

The orientation-seminar was formally opened last July 15 with AFPPS Deputy Commander Col Winston A Ares PAF (GSC) as keynote speaker.

The training was culminated by answering a case study and presenting it before a panel.

“It is a test of how the participants can apply all what they have learned during their training,” explains Col Javier.

The 34 participants were composed of two officers, 14 enlisted personnel and 18 civilian employees assigned to various units under the AFPPS.

“The participants exhibited their interest of the subject matter, lectures and case studies. They were able to raise questions and injected current developments with practical applications,” says Col Javier.

“In addition, participants showed eagerness to partake in hands-on training to further enhance skills, knowledge and experience. They are also given opportunities to try out ideas and received useful responses, discussed situations and problems encountered and how to solve them to maximize their creativity,” he adds.

Col Javier declared that the objectives of the seminar-orientation were achieved with the participants returning to their respective

units and offices possessing additional knowledge and armed with renewed confidence.

“Thus, we can expect them to perform their respective tasks with greater confidence, effectiveness and efficiency,” he says.

Col Javier vowed to continuously conduct similar seminars to equip AFPPS personnel, especially those who are newly-assigned to the Service, with the proper know-how on military procurement system.
